Types of Student Grouping

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Teacher-led instruction with all students participating.

Mingle


Students move around the classroom, interacting with each other individually.

Small Groups

Groups of 3-5 students working together on a task.

Pairs

Two students working together on a task.





Teacher Talk vs Student Talk

Student-Student Talk

Students learn by interacting with each other, fostering a more inclusive and engaging learning experience.

2 Encourage Participation

Ask open-ended questions and allow students to finish their sentences.

3 Smart Seating

Arrange seating in a circle or horseshoe to facilitate interaction.

Maximizing Student Interaction

Thinking Time

Allow time for students to think before answering questions.

Increase Talking Time

Assign pair or small-group activities to promote student speaking.

Facilitate Interaction

Encourage students to ask questions, explain concepts, and teach each other.





Benefits of Small Group Work



Encourage Participation

Give students autonomy and control over their learning.



Assess Progress

Monitor student progress and provide feedback.



Group Dynamics

Develop clear expectations, build group dynamics, and improve peer feedback.

Technology

Use technology to promote interactive learning experiences.

Partner with Teachers

Collaborate with other language teachers to share resources and ideas.

Short Films


Choose motivating films that are age and language appropriate.
